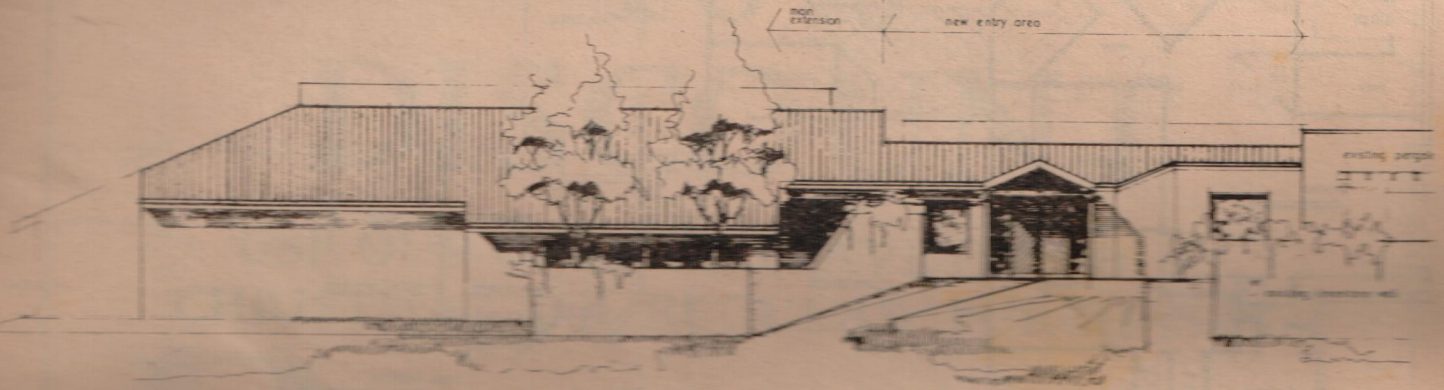


Clubhouse Extensions Proposed



Your Club's Board of Management is giving consideration to a proposal to extend the Clubhouse to provide added amenities for Members.

This follows analysis of the results of our recent area survey which pointed quite clearly to the need for a teenage area, child minding facilities & gymnasium complete with spa-bath and sauna.

Many other additional amenities were asked for but it is not possible to provide everything at this point in time so the Board has concentrated upon the amenities which will benefit the greatest number of members.

A CO-OPERATIVE EFFORT

The City of Canning is about to commence construction of changerooms for the North Ovals, adjacent to the Clubhouse and it has been decided to discuss with Council the feasibility of the Club and Council embarking on a joint project which would incorporate the proposed changerooms and the additional club amenities in the one building, adjoining the Club's existing premises.

Such a development would result in a saving in building costs to both parties and would make more effective use of available land.

OPINIONS SOUGHT

The Board has distributed details of the proposal to the Club's sporting

divisions and has invited comment from them on the desirability of proceeding and on the sketch plans as prepared by the Club's Architects. The initial response has been over-whelmingly in favour of going ahead as soon as possible.

The Board also invites comment from the Members in general.

LOAN FUNDS

Discussions are currently underway with Council to assess the availability

of loan funds which will be required if the project is to proceed.

A financial impact study, including a three year projected cash flow, has been prepared by the Club and cost estimates obtained.

Estimates place the cost of the total project at approximately \$340,000.

The Board is of the opinion that because of the nature of the facilities proposed, ie child

minding & teenage activity areas, the Club's contribution should be set well below fifty percent in recognition of the good which the Club is doing within the Community.

This opinion will be conveyed firmly to Council during the negotiations which will take place during October.

If the project gets the green light from both the Club and Council, construction is expected to commence early in Jan.

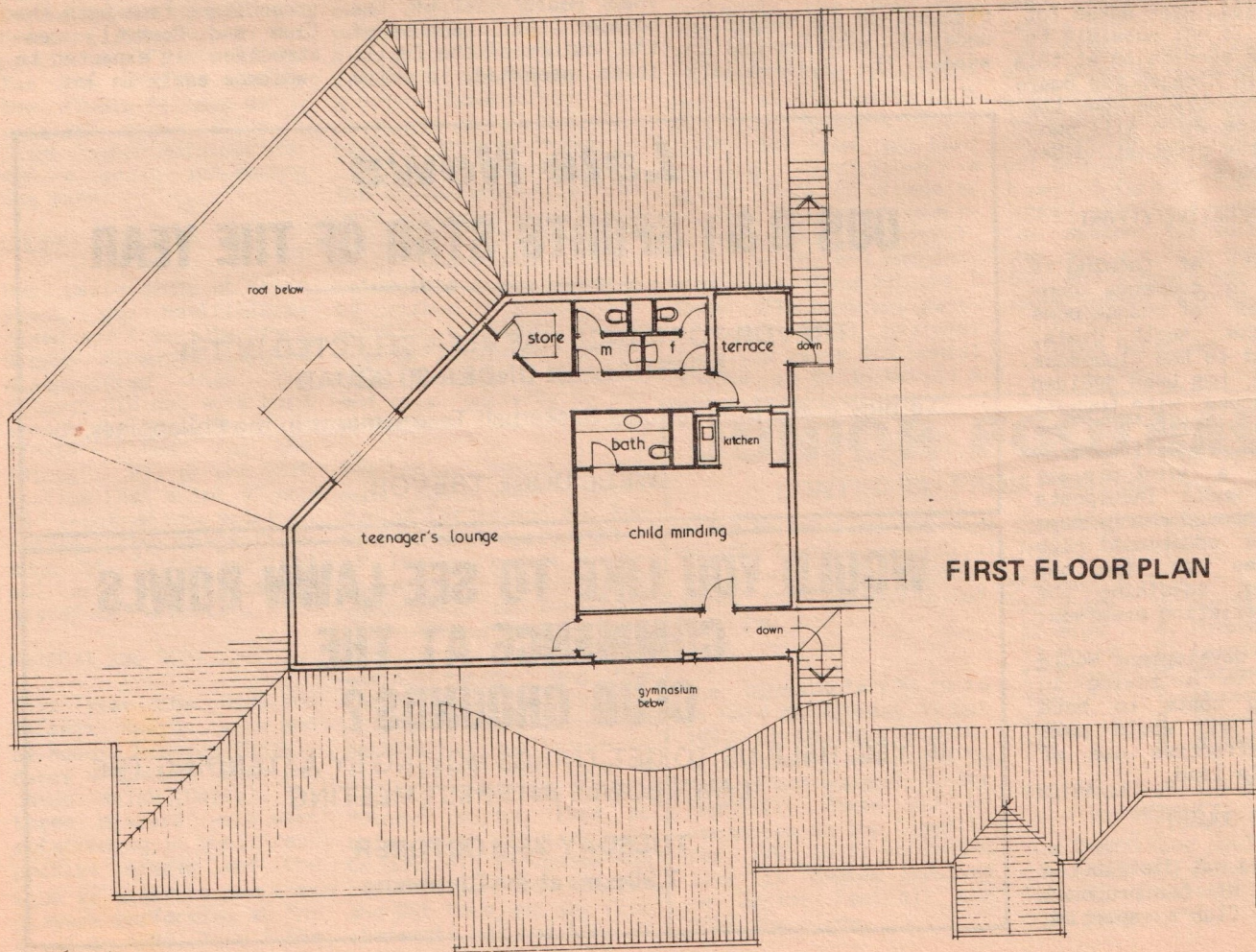

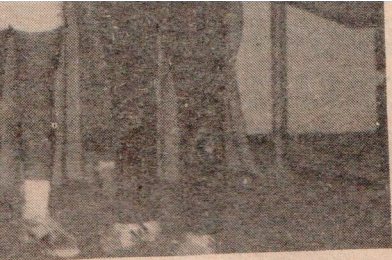

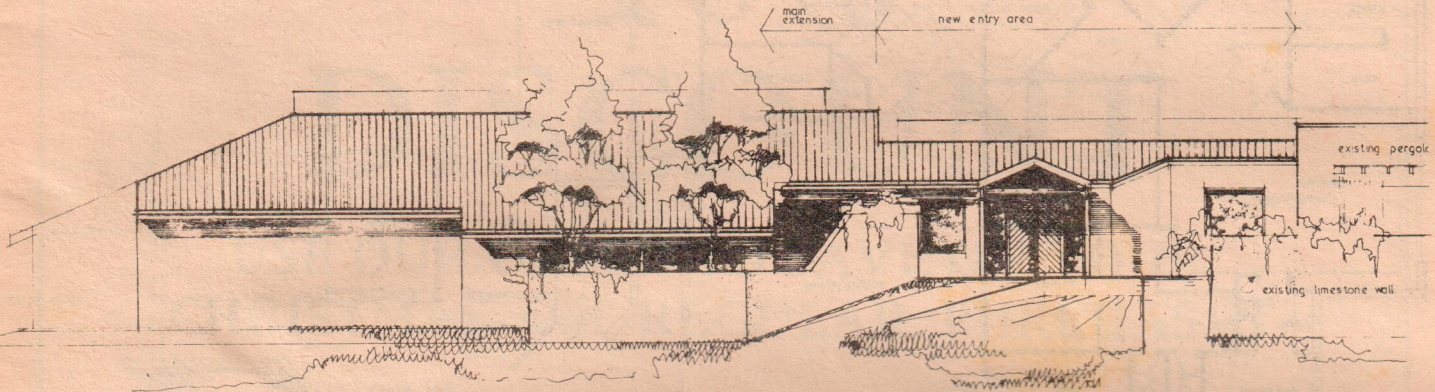

WOULD YOU LIKE TO SEE LAWN BOWLS

SOME RESIDENTS ON WRONG TRACK

A handful of Willetton residents have petitioned the Council not to erect the proposed 1.8 m link mesh fence around the northern ovals at Burrendah Reserve. Their action obviously stems from a lack of understanding of why the fence is necessary & if successful will cause them more problems than they could imagine.

The proposal to fence this small section of the Reserve dates back many years and has long been an integral part of the overall development plan for the area. The fence will have the three fold purpose of protecting resident's homes from stray cricket and hockey balls, preventing parking & traffic problems along Albatross Pass and giving the Club the opportunity to collect revenue from patrons of the snr football matches planned for the Reserve.

Residences along Albatross Pass face directly onto the hockey & cricket areas & stray balls will become a nuisance if anything other than a 1.8 m fence is erected. A fence of this height will prevent balls from encroaching onto the roadway and onto ratepayer's houses.

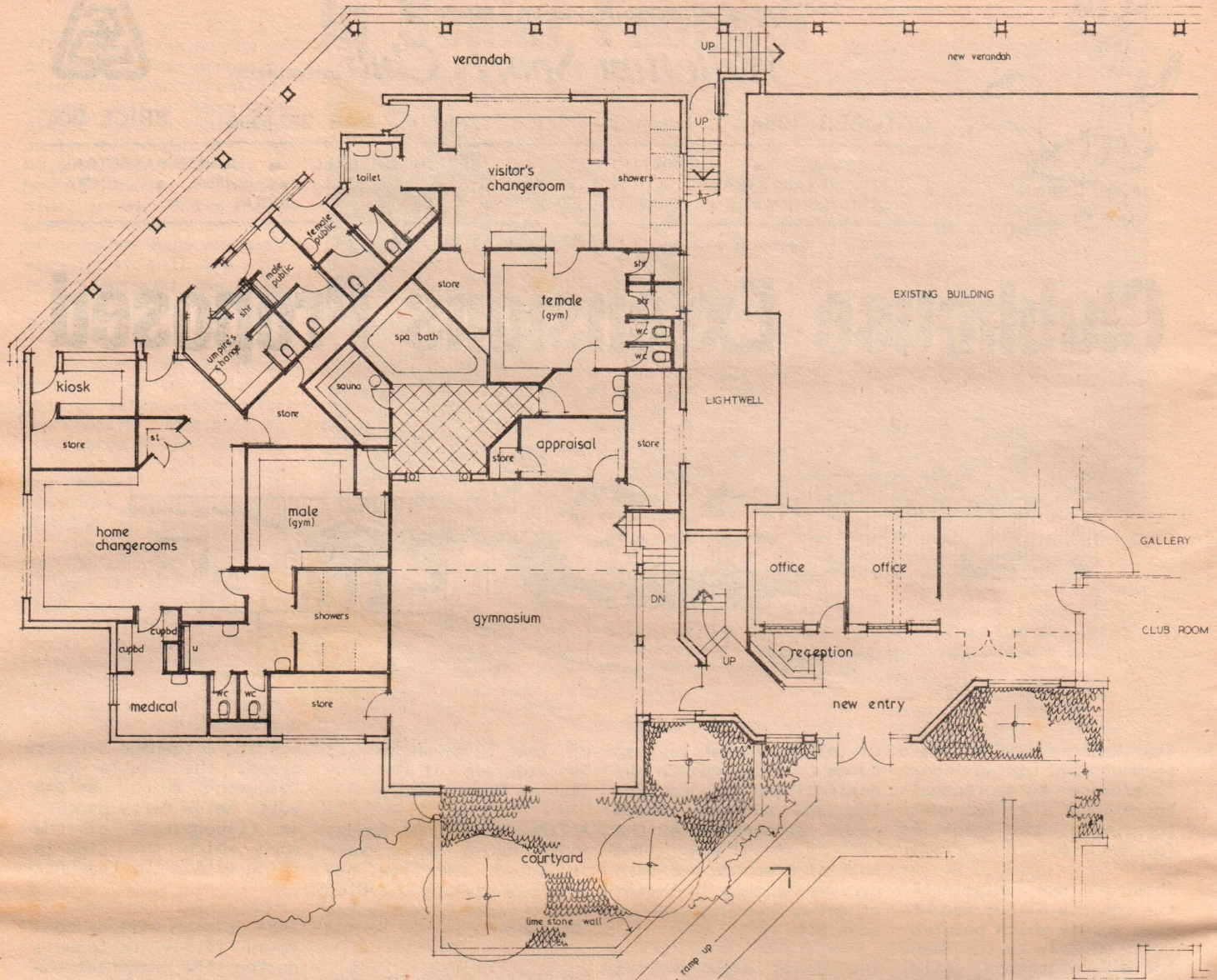
It is also proposed that gateways in the fence facing Albatross Pass which will allow residents free access to the Res. at all other times will be locked during fixtured match times forcing match patrons to park on the Club park or in the tiered parking areas provided. No access by match patrons will be permitted through the Albatross Pass gates.

The Club has adopted this policy because it does not want to see a repeat of the problems caused at Willetton Reserve on home match days.

At Willetton Reserve a 1-2 metre high fence is installed and hundreds of match goers simply park in Donald Street and jump the fence. The Club and residents alike are disadvantaged by this state of affairs and adamant that for the good of all concerned the fence must be at least 1.8 metres high.

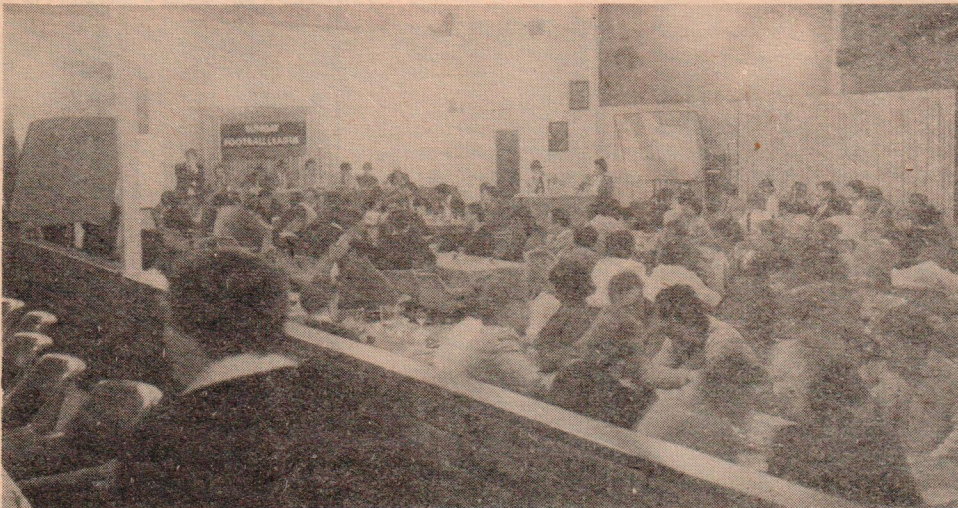
The Club has forwarded these views to Council and has sought an on-site meeting with Council Officers to discuss the matter. The Club is also hoping that local residents will realise the wisdom of the Club's views and will co-operate to bring about an early solution to the problem.

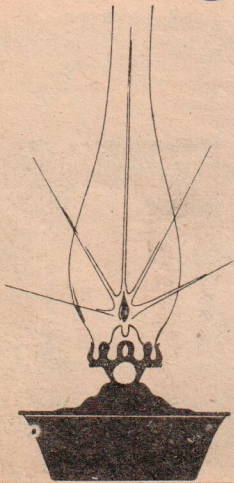
